
Jasper's Beanstalk by N.Butterworth

Walking through the jungle Bobo passes lots of creatures enjoying a cuddle together but Bobo is alone. Will he ever find the hug he needs?





Follow and join in the family's excitement as they wade through the grass, splash through the river and squelch through the mud in search of a bear.






Wolf Brother by Michelle Paver.






The Arrival by Shaun Tan

This silent graphic novel is the story of all who have made the journey.




River Boy by Tim Bowler
